The challenge of GOVERNANCE and SOCIAL ACCURACY:

Beyond excellence, equality and societal constructivism, the values promoted by cultural policies are implemented through cooperative processes. This cooperation develops in a differentiated way according to territories and periods, but according to hierarchies of values and legitimacy that should be more open to the declared diversity of social values and to the participation of the greatest number of people.

PROBLEMS, GAPS, INADEQUACIES

Marketization and participation are often missing balance.

Governance structures are not always adequate to implement context-specific decentralization strategies able to improve consultation processes and to impact social accuracy significantly.

Greater diversity, equality and inclusion may develop only over a long time-horizon.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Public institutions should develop policies
that ensure inclusive approaches and foster a sense of collective participation.

Safeguards should be established against the deliberate sidelining of groups and the hegemony of cultural policy values.

Best practice awards could recognise excellence in cultural organisations and then co-creative talks should be publicly funded, designed, and curated, in collaboration with the awarded institutions.
